A Word From Rabbi Adrienne

Shalom to my Bnai Shalom Family!

Pesach is my favorite holiday! I love the Seder, the special foods, even the preparation! And I love the mitzvot (commandments): telling the story of the

Exodus, eating matzah on the first night, refraining from eating chametz, and not even owning chametz for a week.

This last mitzvah comes from both Exodus and Deuteronomy, which specify that leaven is not permitted to be in our homes for the duration of the festival. But it is almost impossible, let alone expensive, to fully clean out our pantries and consume all of our chametz so that we have zero chametz remaining before Passover each year. What to do? *Mechirat Chametz!*

Mechirat Chametz is the act of selling chametz to someone who is not Jewish so that we do not own it for the duration of the holiday. Because of the complexities of the practice under halacha (Jewish law), most people empower their Rabbi to conduct the sale on their behalf. Throughout the holiday, the buyer has full possession of the property, and has the right to take any of the chametz for their personal use. (My buyers have sometimes availed themselves of Girl Scout cookies!) In Talmudic times, the sale was final, but the common practice today is for the Rabbi to buy the chametz back at the end of Passover, either by paying for it or by having a clause in the contract that nullifies the sale if the final payment is not made.

Why am I telling you all this? Because as your Rabbi I am here to sell your chametz! Not only is it a fun and easy way to fulfill one of the primary mitzvot of Pesach, but it is a great way to support the work we do in the greater community by supporting the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund. I hope you will consider selling your chametz this year!

Chag Pesach Sameach v'Kasher! A Happy and Kosher Passover!
